

Film Sets Record for Most F-Words In Scottish Movie

A SCOTS movie is set for the record books before it's screened - for swearing.

One Day Removals uses the F word more than 320 times, the most ever in a Scottish-made film.

Mark Stirton's black comedy beats the current Scottish record holder, Sweet Sixteen by Ken Loach, which uses the F word and variations 313 times. Filmed in Aberdeen, the new script is described as Laurel and Hardy meets Tarantino and features broad Doric accents throughout.

The stars, Patrick Wright and Scott Ironside, are removal men who end up with a vanload of bodies after a simple move goes horribly wrong. Former Dons star and Gothenburg hero John Hewitt also makes a surprise appearance.

Director and writer Mark, 37, said: "I didn't set out to create any sort of record for F words, because that will take away from how good the film actually is.

"I may actually re-edit it before it is released just to cut the number of F words so people can concentrate on the film itself."
